UAHT has served students and the community for almost 60 years. From our humble beginnings as Red River Vocational-Technical School in 1965, UAHT now serves over 3,000 students each year on campuses in Hope, Texarkana, Historic Washington, Arkansas, and online.

At UAHT, we have something for everyone, from cradle to career. UAHT offers youth summer enrichment programs, early college programs, over 50 certificate and degree programs, adult education, community education courses, and business and industry training.

The presence of Hempstead Hall on the Hope campus provides students and the community with many cultural enrichment opportunities, as well as space to host trainings and events. In addition, Hempstead Hall hosts chart-topping Grammy Award-winning musicians and entertainers.

Another great reason to attend UAHT is that it saves students money. UAHT has one of the most affordable tuition and fee costs in Arkansas, putting our college among the best values in higher education. UAHT offers institutional scholarships and a book rental program that costs students only \$20 per credit hour or about \$60 for many courses. Through the generous gifts of our donors, the UAHT Foundation offers our students over 120 private scholarships. In addition, graduates from high schools in Hempstead County can attend UAHT for free during their first year. Combined with federal and state financial aid opportunities, most of our students graduate college debt-free.

The environment at UAHT is open and friendly, allowing our students to thrive socially and academically. UAHT has small class sizes, ensuring that students have the opportunity to ask questions and get individual attention from instructors. Our campuses have a variety of student organizations and on-campus activities, including student events and intramural sports.

Every aspect of the UAHT mission revolves around student success. From our state-of-the-art facilities and technology to our quality student services and world-class teachers, our purpose is to help our students reach their educational goals.



The University of Arkansas Hope-Texarkana is proud to announce the establishment of the new Hempstead Guarantee Scholarship. Through the Hempstead Guarantee Scholarship, UAHT will provide graduates from high schools in Hempstead County with a scholarship to attend UAHT completely free for their first year, beginning with the class of 2024. The scholarship will provide funds to pay tuition, fees, and book rental costs beyond the financial aid for which students qualify in their first year after high school graduation.

"We are elated to offer an opportunity of this magnitude to Hempstead County residents," Dr. Christine Holt, UAHT Chancellor, said. "The hardworking people of Hempstead County have long supported UAHT with their hard-earned tax dollars, and the creation of this scholarship is one way we can say, 'thank you,' and give back. This scholarship will be a game-changer for many students in Hempstead County who have previously been unable to afford higher education. It will save students over \$9,400 in tuition and fee costs compared to the average yearly cost of public 4-year universities in Arkansas."

As part of the partnership between UAHT and high schools in Hempstead County, the college has agreed to offer concurrent credit courses to high school students, with the high schools partnering to pay the remaining 50% of students' UAHT tuition and fees after any Arkansas Concurrent Challenge Scholarships are applied. "The fact that our Hempstead County schools are willing to develop creative partnerships such as this to eliminate barriers to education for our students is a testament to how much our schools care about the long-term success of students in Hempstead County," Holt said. "With programs like this, every student in Hempstead County now has the opportunity to better their future by earning a technical certificate to get a good job fast or an associate degree to transfer to a 4-year university. Whatever their aim, UAHT can put them miles ahead in achieving that goal. Everyone at UAHT is excited to have your high school graduates enroll at the college this fall for free!"



The University of Arkansas Hope-Texarkana held the grand opening for the new Farmers Bank & Trust Workforce Center on March 16, 2023, at 4:30 p.m. The new 14,754-square-foot facility on the Texarkana campus houses a welding program, the Secondary Career and Technical Education Center, the Arkansas High Collegiate Academy, community meeting rooms, and more.



Dr. Christine Holt, UAHT Chancellor, said the new facility is a testament to UAHT's dedication to higher education in the Texarkana area community and the region. "The College has seen significant growth at the Texarkana campus, which shows that the Texarkana community is committed to us," Holt said. "Therefore, we want to showcase our commitment to this region by expanding our footprint to improve and grow the programs and services we offer our Texarkana area constituents. BELLWETHER AWARD FINALIST

The University of Arkansas Hope-Texarkana was named a top 10 national finalist for the highly coveted Bellwether Consortium Awards in the Instructional Programs & Services category for the college's innovative collegiate academy high schools. Community colleges from 19 states submitted entries for the 2022 competition, and UAHT was the only community college finalist from Arkansas. Bellwether finalists represent leading community colleges whose outstanding and innovative programs and practices were selected among competitive submissions as exemplary. According to the Consortium, the award "focuses on cutting-edge, trendsetting programs worthy of replication."

The UAHT collegiate academies operate in partnership with the Hope Public School District and the Texarkana Arkansas School District. The goal of the academies is to provide academic and career pathways to a diverse group of students by offering a three-year curriculum that allows them the opportunity to complete a high school diploma and an associate degree simultaneously while being fully immersed on a college campus. The academies are available to students entering the 10th grade and who meet the entrance requirements to attend. The academies are free of charge and are located on the University of Arkansas Hope and Texarkana campuses.



UAHT COMMENCEMENT CEREMONY 2023

The 2023 University of Arkansas Hope-Texarkana commencement ceremony was held on Tuesday, May 16, at 6:00 p.m. in Hempstead Hall on the Hope Campus. The UAHT Foundation, in partnership with the Hope-Hempstead County Chamber of Commerce, brought in platinum country music recording artist and charttopper Mark Wills to headline the 47th Annual Hope Watermelon Festival. The concert was a huge success with fun and entertainment for the whole family.

UAHT ENROLLEMENT LARGEST SINCE 2019

The University of Arkansas Hope-Texarkana welcomed 1,292 students for the fall 2023 semester. This number represents a 9% increase over the previous year and the college's largest fall enrollment since 2019.

"We are thrilled with the positive trajectory in enrollment," said UAHT Chancellor Dr. Christine Holt. "As rural community colleges across the nation continue to struggle with decreasing enrollment, this increase is a testament to the hard-working faculty and staff at UAHT who continue to put students first. Our collaborative and innovative efforts in how we serve students equate to their success as they enter the workforce or transfer to a four-year university."

Among the factors contributing to rising enrollment is an increase of 24% in high school student enrollment through concurrent credit, the Hope and Arkansas High Collegiate Academies, and the Secondary Career & Technical Education Center. The college also experienced a 28% increase in students transferring to UAHT from other institutions.

"More students are beginning to see the value of attending a community college," Holt said. "We strive to keep tuition and fees affordable, and with the addition of many scholarships and the Hempstead Guarantee along with Arkansas state scholarships and in-state tuition for border county residents, a college education at UAHT is one of the greatest values in higher education. Our innovative early college high school programs, technical training programs, health professions programs, and world-class general education transfer degrees provide a bridge to the future for every student."



UAHT OFFERING NEW TECHNICAL & INDUSTRIAL COURSE SCHEDULE

The University of Arkansas Hope-Texarkana began offering a revised class schedule for technical and industrial courses in the spring 2023 semester. To better accommodate students, the college is offering more classes one, two, and three days per week rather than the traditional five days per week. UAHT is also offering some technical and industrial courses online and welding courses on the Texarkana campus this spring.

"We understand that many people cannot quit their jobs or get enough hours at work going to school five days a week," said Jennifer Teresa, Dean of Technical and Industrial Programs at UAHT. "The technical and industrial division at the college has worked closely with current and potential students to create a schedule that will hopefully better suit their needs. This schedule will allow students to come to the college less frequently, allowing them to work more while attending school.

There are many great, high-paying jobs that our programs equip students to attain. We want to help them in any way we can to get the credentials for those jobs."



AN OFT-DELAYED COLLEGE EXPERIENCE FINDS MOTHER & DAUGHTER IN COLLEGE AT THE SAME TIME IN A UNIQUE WAY

Two-and-a-half decades after having her college dreams delayed by the birth of her first child, Brandy Taylor graduated from the University of Arkansas Hope-Texarkana Funeral Services program as part of the class of 2022. "I always wanted to go to college, but sometimes things happen in life to change or delay your course," Taylor said. "The biggest obstacle I had to overcome was myself. As they say, 'The hardest part of something is the start.' Simply being scared to start something new, since I had not been in any school since 1996, was my biggest challenge."

Brandy decided to begin her journey back to college by enrolling in classes at UAHT in the fall of 2020. "UAHT was my first choice for college because it was the only college in the area to offer funeral service education and because my daughter worked there as an instructor," Taylor said. "Sometimes you see a child and parent end up in college taking classes together, but it is not often that you see a daughter teaching her mother in college. It was certainly an experience I never imagined would happen."

Brittni Hardie (Brandy's daughter) is a Computer and Information Science Instructor at UAHT. "For a long time, I've encouraged my mom to go back to college because it would open doors to more opportunities for her," Brittni said. "I also encouraged her to go into a trade or specialized field where good jobs are in high demand. I knew it would be a challenge for her, but my mom is used to overcoming challenges. She was only fifteen when she became a mom, which presented many challenges in both of our lives. She was there to help me throughout those difficult times, and I was thankful to be in a position where I could now guide her in something that would better her life."

"Going back to school after being out for so long and while working was a difficult challenge to juggle," Brandy said. "However, with the help of my daughter, husband, and all the faculty and staff at UAHT, I finally became a college graduate. I encourage anyone thinking of going back to college or even going for the first time not to have second thoughts about attending because it is worth it. In fact, I have already secured a position as an Apprentice Funeral Director/Embalmer at Texarkana Funeral Home. With a little hard work and the support you will receive from everyone at UAHT, you too can succeed."



HEAD OF CLASS AWARD

Jared Bradley of Gurdon, Arkansas, was named "Head of the Class" through a student recognition program by Malco Products, SBC, the nation's leading manufacturer of tools of the trade for trade professionals. Three 2022 Hope Collegiate Academy graduates, Collin Easterling, Hunter Mathis, and Juan Leon helped the Arkansas Tech University robotics team earn a top-10 world ranking in the skills component of the competition during a VEX U event in Houston, Texas, in March. The trio transferred to ATU in the fall of 2022 to major in mechanical engineering.

"I cannot stress enough how thankful I am for the Collegiate Academy experience I had at UAHT," Mathis said. "If I had come straight to a 4-year university from a traditional high school, I would have been in complete panic and fear at the extreme amount of work I have. However, everything now feels completely normal because I have already experienced what it is like to work hard and study for college classes. Taking college classes at the Collegiate Academy prepared me to succeed as soon as I stepped on the Arkansas Tech campus. I am incredibly grateful for my wonderful experience at the UAHT Collegiate Academy and highly recommend that others take advantage of this great opportunity."

"The Collegiate Academy provided me with so many opportunities that most people don't have," Easterling said. "The academy is challenging, but it is rewarding in the end. It prepares you for the rigor of college and teaches you how to succeed at a university before you even get there. It helped me tremendously."

"Deciding to become a student at the Collegiate Academy was a great decision for me," Leon said. "The college workload is different from a traditional high school setting. We had to learn how to manage our time because we had much more homework, and it was more academically challenging. However, learning these lessons and becoming used to the rigorous standards all paid off in the end and prepared me to step onto ATU's campus ready to succeed."
